FLAG SALUTE

Council President Trueblood led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance, announced that notice of the meeting was given in accordance with the Open Public Meetings Act, and followed by roll call.

CALL TO ORDER

Council President Trueblood called the meeting to order at approximately 6:00 p.m.

CLOSED SESSION

193-2018 Authorizes Council to go into Closed Session – Not Adopted

Council President Trueblood advised that there would be no Closed Session.

PRESENTATIONS

1. Swearing in of Pemberton Township Police Department Recruits.

Mayor Patriarca came forward to swear in new recruits; Adam Schalon, Alexander Hamilton and Philip Macy. Mayor Patriarca spoke on how the Police family has grown since he was sworn in back in 1984. Encouraged the new officers and advised them that this was a great community to work for. Welcomed them aboard and thanked their families.

2. County Clerk Timothy Tyler to present KIA Flag to Pemberton Township.

Mr. Tyler came forward to explain that the flag was for military members killed in action. Advised on how the flag came about and where it is to be flown. Noted that Burlington County hoisted their flag on August 7th, 2018. Stated that they began an initiative to get these flags to each municipality. Mr. Tyler presented the flag to Mayor Patriarca and Council President Trueblood. Mayor Patriarca asked for the proper protocol for this flag. Mr. Tyler advised that this is a State recognized flag and not a Nationally recognized flag, but that they are working on that. Noted that Chris Christie authorized this when he was Governor.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Council President Trueblood opened the meeting up to general public comments.

Dave Kulpa, Browns Mills – 1. Stated he likes living here after driving a tractor trailer for 45 years. Noted that he is retired and disabled and is stressed out from a violation he received from Code Enforcement for his carport. Stated he had it erected 6 months ago and it is a temporary structure. Commented that he uses it to keep his car protected from the snow and other elements as it is harder for him to clean off. Stated he read the code and does not see how it affects him. Noted that he was advised by Dave Benedetti that carports have been outlawed for many years and they are just now getting to sending out violations. Asked for the Council to consider having a grandfather law and only violating those that are put up now. Councilman Allen asked if he had obtained a permit. Mr. Kulpa advised that the company told him he did not need one because it was a temporary structure. Councilman Gardner asked which code he was referencing. Mr. Kulpa stated 190-3. Mr. Bayer asked to review the summons. Mr. Kulpa provided it. Mr. Bayer advised that under 190-3 it is not a permitted use and that they would have to check what the permitted uses are. Mayor Patriarca stated that it was his understanding that they are writing the violations

as this type of use is a non-permitted use and that is why the company he hired could not get a permit. Stated they would have had to go to the Zoning Board to get a variance. Noted that he is sure the company did not hear from the Township that they did not need a permit, they just told him that because one could not be issued. Stated that it would be up to Council to decide if they would change zoning. Advised that while Mr. Kulpa may have his nicely put up there is a problem throughout the town with many being in disarray. Mr. Kulpa stated that he has spoken to his neighbor who is fine with it being up. Mayor Patriarca explained the regulations and inspections. A discussion ensued on the issues and why this was a violation. Mr. Kulpa asked that Council take into consideration and expressed his thoughts on what he felt would be fair. Councilman Gardner clarified 190-3.1.

America Phillips, Presidential Lakes – 1. Asked for an update on the Firehouse in Presidential Lakes. Mayor Patriarca advised that they are on schedule. Noted that they are in the final design phase with colors and faucets being selected. Added that Public Works would be starting the grading work soon. Commented that it is scheduled to be completed between February and March of 2019. Ms. Phillips asked about the well and septic. Mayor Patriarca advised they are working on that as well. **2.** Ms. Phillips asked about the sign at the entrance of Presidential Lakes. Councilman Allen noted that the last time this was discussed they were checking into this to see if the sign was Township or County property. Mayor Patriarca stated he was looking into it. Stated the sign is not on Township property. Not sure where they are at with determining who it belongs to. **3.** Ms. Phillips asked if the Township could please cut the weeds at the entrance. Noted the other areas that have been cleaned up.

Council President Trueblood asked Council if they would like to take a 5-minute recess to congratulate the new officers. Council took a 5-minute recess.

Council meeting resumed at 6:37 p.m.

James Boland, 226 Filbert St. – 1. Stated that he has noticed a slight improvement but since the last meeting it has stayed the same and not gotten any worse. Stated he does not know where efforts are being concentrated but has the feeling that we are going to find out if there really is going to be a big change. Stated when you have enough time to see things and expect that it will get cleaned up soon, but years go by and it is the same. Stated he wants to see things change and does not know if that is happening. Stated he has come to meeting after meeting and hounded Code Enforcement. Stated he thinks only time will tell if we are in a sweeping change. Councilman Gardner stated that he understands him wanting change but that this is a very large town with 64 square miles. Stated that something is happening and all resources cannot just be focused on his block. Asked Mr. Boland to give it time and things will change. Mr. Boland stated that was positive.

Seeing no other residents wishing to be heard, this portion of the meeting was closed to the public.

ORDINANCES FOR INTRODUCTION

ORDINANCE 20-2018

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PEMBERTON REPEALING ORDINANCES 11-2017, 12-2017 AND 13-2017 WHICH AUTHORIZED THE SALE OF THREE (3) PROPERTIES TO EDITH CLAYTON.

Councilman Allen asked why Ms. Clayton could no longer complete these purchases. Mayor Patriarca advised she had moved from the area and it would no longer benefit her to have properties here and asked for Council to reconsider and refund her all but the expenses.

Motion by Allen and Jackson to introduce Ordinance 20-2018 with a Public Hearing to be held at the September 19, 2018 meeting. Allen, yes; Jackson, yes; Gardner, yes; McCartney, yes; Trueblood, yes. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE 21-2018

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PEMBERTON AMENDING CHAPTER 94 OF THE CODE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PEMBERTON, ENTITLED 'DOGS AND OTHER ANIMALS'

Council agreed for the two guests to come forward to discuss this ordinance. Ann Rapasarda and Dawn Weston from the Burlington County Animal Shelter came forward to discuss this ordinance. Noted that this ordinance was approved at the County level in 2017 with Resolution AR237 was passed at the New Jersey State level asking shelters to adopt no kill policies. Explained that this ordinance was for the trapping, neutering and return of feral and stray cats. Noted that it decreases the feral cat population over time and also helps with adoption. Stated that many people think it would be best to gather all of the cats and have them euthanized but when the old cats move out new cats move in. Advised on the various benefits that this program will bring including cost savings to the taxpayers. Noted that Pemberton Township pays \$35 for each cat that is euthanized but that this would be paid for by the Friends of Burlington County. Provided some statistics as to the cat population including hoarding and feeding. Noted the issues they had with this ordinance including Animal Control coming to pick up these cats after they have been trapped, vaccinated, neutered and released. This would mean that there was a \$100.00 dead cat. Noted what Shamong Township has done with their ordinance. Mr. Bayer asked where this language came from. Mayor Patriarca stated that some of it came from the Shamong ordinance with some slight changes to protect the Township. Stated that if there is a resident that is

complaining these cats would fall into an unprotected zone because you cannot call Fish and Game to come for them because they are domesticated and you could not call animal control because it would be permitted. Stated he is not sure how the releasing works. Ms. Weston gave an example that would allow animal control to get the cats. Mr. Bayer stated that they Mayor was speaking on someone who does not want the cats in their yard what does animal control do. Mayor Patriarca asked how they identify the cat caregiver and if they get chipped. Ms. Weston advised they do not get chipped. Mayor Patriarca asked how the resident who does not like or want cats is protected. Stated he does not know the answer but has to consider all of the residents. Discussion ensued on the feral cats and the rights of all neighbors. Mr. Bayer asked what happens with the cat that is trapped, neutered and returned. Ms. Weston advised on the process and the cat being returned to the person or area they were removed from. Councilman Gardner asked what happens when the cat is roaming in the neighbor's yard. Ms. Weston advised that the cat is picked up and euthanized. Spoke on the money they spent that is wasted because then the cat is dead. Councilwoman Jackson asked what they did not like about letter (b). Ms. Weston advised that is should say shall be exempt instead of shall not be exempt. Councilman Allen asked how you exempt cats from State Laws. Mr. Bayer stated that a town cannot circumvent or supersede State Laws. Mayor Patriarca advised that they were asking Council to permit domestic animals to roam other people's private property. Ms. Weston stated they are not domestic. Mayor Patriarca stated that cats and dogs are considered domesticated and that is why animal control can pick them up. Stated he understands that it is not fair for them to invest all of this money and then the cat gets euthanized, but you also have to consider what is fair to the people who do not want the cats. Asked if we are considering the majority of people or the majority of cats. Ms. Weston stated she does not think that there are as many people complaining as there are that do not complain. Mayor Patriarca stated that animal control will not be out if there is no complaint. Ms. Weston stated that is what they are hoping for. Noted that cats tend to stick on their property, but she does know when the colonies are large people complain. Advised on the definition of a feral cat being one born in the wild or offspring. Councilman Allen read the definition of a feral cat. Ms. Weston stated that a cat left in the wild will revert back to feral instincts even if once domesticated. Councilwoman McCartney stated that they need to discuss warnings or fines and that the other issue is there needs to be some way to identify these cats to their owners. Ms. Weston stated that they do tend to know who the cat feeders are in the town. Discussion ensued on identifying the cats and their owners. Mr. Bayer stated that other than tipping the ear there is no way to know. Councilwoman McCartney clarified the process and that there is no record. Mayor Patriarca suggested that lobbying the State would be a better idea and that maybe feral cats would fall under Fish and Game keeping animal control from picking them up. Ms. Weston stated it was passed at the State and County level and they now need the Townships. Mr. Bayer asked if the County Ordinance applied to feral cats on County property or if they do animal control as well. Mayor Patriarca stated that they only control the animal shelter and that the State governs our animal control as well as Fish and Game. Stated that is why he believes they should be lobbying the State to include feral cats under Fish and Gssame as wild animals and then that would take the authority away from municipalities. Mayor Patriarca advised that if the State passes a statute we have to abide by it. Ms. Weston stated that this was passed at the State level. Mayor Patriarca stated they would have to revue what was passed and how it was worded. Mr. Bayer asked for a copy of the Ordinance to be given to the Deputy Clerk for copies to be made. Suggested to Council that he look at the law to see what it states and then he could advise Council at the next meeting. Ms. Weston advised that feral cats only live 8 to 10 years unlike a house cat which can live up to 20 years. Councilman Allen stated that under (F) it stated that no community cat should be released on any government owned property and feels additional language stating were these cats can actually be released at. It was noted that all of this is paid for through fund raising by the shelter and not by taxpayers. Council President Trueblood commended both ladies for their passion and volunteering.

Mr. Bayer suggested tabling this introduction until he can provide Council with a clearer understanding of the Township's role in this. Stated he would provide Council with something before the next meeting. Mayor Patriarca stated that administration is in favor of and supports the program but has to be conscientious of how it will affect other residents. Noted the complaints he has heard about the money spent to euthanize the cats and that the money is taken from the dog fund to cover the costs. Stated he wants to make sure we get it right.

Motion by McCartney and Jackson to table Ordinance 21-2018. McCartney, yes; Jackson, yes; Gardner, yes; Allen, yes; Trueblood, yes. Motion carried.

aNEW BUSINESS

1. Public Works - Purchase of 20 ft. Shipping Container for tires from Atlantic Trailer Leasing Corp., in the amount of \$2,525.00. *Pulled from the Consent Agenda.*

Councilman Allen asked what the shipping container would be used for. Mayor Patriarca advised it would be used to store tires until they receive a certain number and will get rid of them. Noted they prefer to store them inside were they are less hazardous.

Motion by Allen and Gardner to approve New Business item A1. Allen, yes; Gardner, yes; Jackson, yes; McCartney, yes; Trueblood, yes. Motion carried.

2. Police Department - Annual Power DMS Subscription from Power DMS, in the amount of \$4,044.75. *Pulled from the Consent Agenda.*

Councilman Allen asked what this system was for. Mayor Patriarca advised that it is an online program for the Police department to use. Explained how and what it is used for to include training.

Motion by Allen and McCartney to approve New Business item A2. Allen, yes; McCartney, yes; Gardner, yes; Jackson, yes; Trueblood, yes. Motion carried.

b. Parade Permit (Public Hearing Required)

Council President Trueblood opened this portion of the meeting for a public hearing. Seeing no one wishing to be heard, this portion of the meeting was closed.

Council had no discussion.

Motion by McCartney and Jackson to approve the Bill List as amended. McCartney, yes; Jackson, yes; Gardner, yes; Allen, yes with the exception of any and all grants and bills pertaining to the NJ State Police or the Attorney General's office; Trueblood, yes. Motion carried.

****Note:** After a discussion on the School Tax Payment. Mr. Bayer advised that the rule of necessity could be used and Council could vote.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT:

Mr. Bayer reported: Nothing to report.

MAYOR'S AND/OR BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT:

Mayor Patriarca reported: Reminded that Friday night was movie night in White Bogs. Believed that Recreation would be showing a Bugs Life. Provided an update on the Rail to Trails project. Stated they came in well above what they had anticipated. Decided to go to Public Works and they are now working on the project now and should come in under \$10,000.00. Noted that they had to delay the road program to get this done. Advised that the milling machine has come in and they will begin using that soon. Commented that the Firehouse/Community Center in Presidential Lakes is on schedule. Stated that they have finished the final design on the addition to the Police Department as well. Noted they have met with the contractor and the Chief to go over the design and they feel it will work well Police operations. Advised everyone that the Italian American Festival was all this weekend and encouraged all to attend.

COMMENTS BY COUNCIL MEMBERS:

Councilwoman McCartney – Advised that Sunday, September 23rd at 2:00 p.m. at the BMIA building there would be a Mayor and Council Township forum for all to come out to meet the candidates in the Election. State that Friday September 28th the Soroptimist Candlelight Vigil would be held at the Peace Garden at 5:30 p.m.

Councilman Allen – Advised that the Friendship AME Church would be hosting their 3rd annual Health Fair in the Acme parking lot from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Councilwoman Jackson – Congratulated the new officers. Reminded all that school was starting the next day and asked to keep all of the children and staff in prayer. Asked drivers to be cautious with the kids going to their buses and walking to school. Council President Trueblood – Thanked all for coming out. Thanked the ladies from the Burlington County Animal Shelter for coming out and volunteering their time. Welcomed the officers and thanked Mr. Tyler for the KIA flag.
